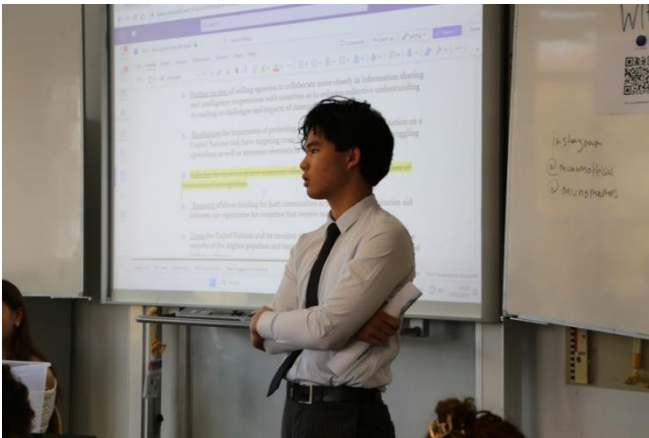

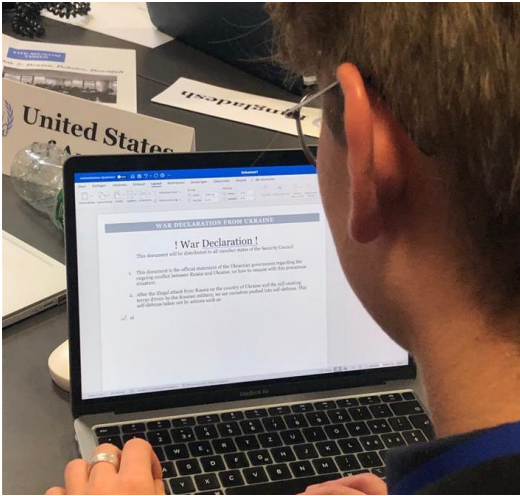

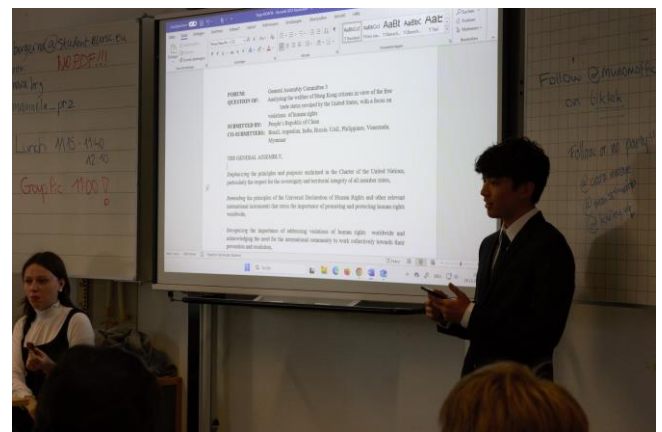


***"Ding Dong your opinion is wrong"***

We were very surprised when we observed the situation in class today and compared to the last few days there wasn't much "fire" in the debates this time.

These past two days, the nations of all committees have been presenting their different resolutions. Most of the delegates of ECOSOC 2 have been taking it seriously, but as an observer, I have seen some of the candidates slacking off or simply not participating. We don't want to name any names, but many of the more passionate delegates have also sensed this lack of resolve. When asked why the lazy delegates have not been as active as the others, they replied with numerous lackadaisical answers. Examples are, "I'm too good for this group", or "I was tired today". Furthermore, in private we asked them which exec was doing the least amount of work, and a repeating idea is that the financial team isn't doing their share of work and is missing important excel files for the press team. When asked about this, they ultimately denied the allegations and said it was preposterous and that it's the heads of ad staff that are slacking off. With this back and forth, we are not sure who to trust, so we will leave that decision for you to decide.



We also asked team members of the press team who aren't journalists for their input. The film crew had some interesting opinions of the press execs. They feel they aren't communicating with them enough, and that their workload is too much for their 4-person team. Photographers stated that their work was hard, but it was manageable. *The clear effects of punishment show: how GA2 has risen from its ashes on Day 3*

Wednesday's impacting press conference, along with harsh executive's notes to the delegates seem to have scared off the member states of GA2 and managed to set them straight. Involvement has increased, with more than half of the committee taking part in the debate during the first hour, including Vietnam and Venezuela; however, the delegate of Egypt seems to be more interested in Flamenco music, rather than the topics discussed in the General Assembly.

South Sudan's resolution about the abuse of power by Fortune 100s executives has been heavily debated up until now, with five amendments and one secondary amendment being submitted, only one of which has passed. South Sudan proposes the strengthening of anti-monopolization laws and asks for clearer and more transparent processes between small and large companies. This has caused Eritrea to present an amendment furthering interference between governments and their respective economies, which has been heavily criticized by the delegation of New Zealand, who seems to be in favor of free market policies.

Following, the Republic of Korea had presented a new resolution about the global supply chain crisis. Their country's economy felt threatened by the financial power of countries such as China, and thus wanted to make the supply chain more resilient. After the delegate's speech, Russia chose to insult Ukraine's delegation by submitting an amendment designed to fracture Ukraine's

international economy, isolating them from the rest of Europe, Asia, and North America. The amendment was overruled by a clear majority, even though China and Russia teamed up and voted in favor for it to pass.

Thursday's debates have shown the potential of this committee to achieve change in the world, and, in contrast to Wednesday, delegates seem to be invested in speaking in favor of and against amendments and resolutions to make their countries' voice heard, which in the end, is essential for political advancements.

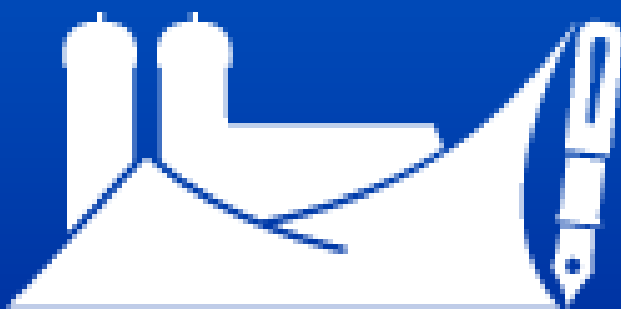
